Jesus Cares

Hebrews 4:15

For we do not have a high priest who is unable to empathize with our weaknesses, but we have one who has been tempted in every way, just as we are—yet he did not sin.

Jesus knows how we feel. He knows what it is to be tempted. He knows what it is to experience loss. He knows what it is like to be let down and betrayed. He knows what it is like to be lied about and abused. He knows what it is to live with family. He knows what it is to have

friends. All this and more. So when the Bible reminds us of the sympathy that Jesus has for us in all the experiences of our lives we are comforted and encouraged.

Jesus cares for us. Time and again the Gospels reveal how his heart responded with compassion toward: hungry crowds; a widow grieving the death of her son; a man suffering leprosy; the city of Jerusalem; and countless many others. His heart went out to those in need: toward those who were victims; toward those who had contributed to their own predicament.

The empathy that Jesus has toward us is a comfort and encouragement.

Even in the unique circumstances of our lives we can be assured that Jesus knows how we feel, and that Jesus cares for us in our circumstances.

We can be further encouraged by remembering that Jesus' empathy and compassion are not affected by the weaknesses and imperfections that beset us.

Whereas Jesus' experiences mean he knows how we feel, those experiences have not marred him or remained with him in a way that affects his attitudes or decisions. Our empathy is often the remembrance of our own scars – physical and emotional – and those scars sometime skew our abilities to care as we should. That is never the case with Jesus.

Jesus' compassion, his desire to help and provide, is not coloured by his own needs or affected in any way by the way his support and provision have been treated by others – or even by us in the past! His care isn't marked by resentment about what it costs him, or by expectation of what he will get out of providing that care.

Jesus knows how we feel, but he doesn't feel things exactly like we do.

Jesus cares for us, but his care is not like any care we've provided or experienced from others.

Jesus is open-hearted and whole-hearted, in the purest and greatest sense that we can understand that description.

As we embark on our annual pilgrimage toward our remembrance of the death and resurrection of our Saviour, we're blessed to dwell on the highest expression of his empathy and compassion toward us as we revisit the cross and empty tomb of Jesus. Finding ourselves at the place where love and mercy meet, we don't know what lies ahead of us, or what we'll need to sustain us. But we can be certain that Jesus will care for us and carry us through.

Karnkendi - Christmas lead up / New year.

After the many issues for us all with the pandemic combined with SA cross border rules life has started to get back to normal, finally, late in November 2021 with our borders opening up.

Prior to Christmas, just out of the blue, we received a 2 week booking for a small group of folk from the Glenelg Hopkins Management Catchment Authority (GHMCA) researching the Sanderling (a timid coastal bird). They insisted on paying the minimum rate per night even though we offered a little deal for such a small number of 6 -10, this booking reduced to only a week after the migration movements changed but it has also lead to another week being booked just prior to Easter.

Just post Christmas saw a Thai family group from Melbourne use the camp for the first time. They enjoyed the area and facility so much that they have just rebooked and paid the deposit for 4 nights in early January 2023.

A long term booking saw a family group that have been regular users from Warrnambool/Koroit/Portland return to Karnkendi. Too many emails and calls happened prior to this one due to the fragile restrictions etc., but they all had a lovely time in Nelson.

In late January we would usually have Scotch College from Adelaide here for their rowing camp but it will be another year before they return with the timing of the pandemic.

Looking forward we have Tenison Woods Catholic College Senior Music Camp 23-25 March and they will be followed up with the Juniors in a couple of months. It is good to have them back at the camp after a break pre-COVID.

Another Thai family group are in for Easter and then a series of large camps from Beacon Hills Christian College Melbourne which will take us into early June.

The house renting is going well with another second-hand washing machine fitted a few weeks ago.

The island bench in the kitchen is finally sorted with a new sealed storage base and we are working to getting the new tank and water softener connected up soon.

Two Sundays ago the proprietors of "Big Sky Adventures" from Adelaide stayed for a night as they are scouting out new events and accommodation for their Great Ocean Road guided walk tour happening later in the year.

It is going to be a bit of a slow year with less groups than normal but it is great not to be cancelling events at this time.

We are overdue for a committee meeting which should happen soon with the border requirements removed.


From January 2nd, because of the large outbreak of Covid-19, our regular weekly Worship services were put into recess, to protect our many vulnerable members, and will begin again very soon.





Pressing the 'Re-set' button



On the 22nd June 1977, the Presbyterian Church of Australia stood at a crossroads. That was the day that the Uniting Church of Australia formally came into existence. The members of the Presbyterian Church of Australia who wanted to continue as the Presbyterian Church had to start the hard work of rebuilding many of its various departments — Social Services, Aged Care, Theological Education etc. Of course planning for the continuation of the various departments had begun a few years prior to 1977.

Part of this process naturally involved the church's global missions arm. On the 22nd June 1977, the Presbyterian Church of Australia had 130 missionaries. On the 23nd June 1977, the Presbyterian Church of Australia had 4 missionaries (2 families) Pastor Bill & Mrs Sue Camden and Pastor Walter & Mrs Rosemary Zurrer serving in Vanuatu.

It was an opportunity to press the re-set button on global mission. Prior to 1977 the Presbyterian Church had primarily worked with overseas Presbyterian Churches and sent Presbyterian missionaries to those churches. Now the Presbyterian Church recognised those Presbyterians who served with mission agencies such as SIM, OMF, Wycliffe. Prior to 1977 they hadn't been recognised by the denomination as missionaries.

Under the leadership of men such as the Rev Mervyn Roberts, Rev Ken Gardner, Rev Bob Missenden, Mr Paul Kahl and Dr Rex Burns (an elder from Hurstville, NSW), Australian Presbyterian World Mission came into being. Former missionary, the Rev Robert Benn says "I went to my first meeting of the continuing Presbyterian mission committee at Ann Street Presbyterian Church. I'm not sure that I've ever had such a buzz in respect to what was happening in the church." They were difficult but heady days.



This map of the 'missionary units' (singles, couples or families) who serve today is a visual depiction of God's grace compared to 1977. What a privilege it is to be able to serve alongside brothers and sisters in so many countries!

Within Australia, there are 49 missionary units. These missionaries serve in various contexts: (a) Indigenous ministry; (b) Bible translation based in Australia; (c) commuting overseas from their Australian base; or (d) work in mission agency roles in Australia.

APWM's Structure



How does APWM work? The APWM National Committee is a committee of the Presbyterian Church's General Assembly of Australia. It is responsible for setting the policies and procedures for both itself and each of the APWM State Committees. It also helps in coordinating the ministry of the APWM State Committees.



The National Committee is made up of members elected by the General Assembly of Australia and representatives of the State Committees. All of these Committees enjoy an incredibly harmonious relationship — something that we recognise as coming from God and not from ourselves. Many of our APWM Committees have subcommittees which focus on particular areas e.g. the National Committee's Aboriginal subcommittee.

What sort of gifts do we need on these committees? A mix of people with gifts in areas such as theology, administration and practical mission experience. When these gifts are used together the work of global mission is better served.

The National Office



The National Committee runs an office based at Christ College in Sydney. It is here that Kevin Murray (National Director) and Sheryl Sarkoezy (Director's Assistant, 4 days per week) and Bruce Campbell (Accounts Clerk, 2 days per week) work together to coordinate the Presbyterian Church of Australia's global mission ministry.
