The Glory of Christmas

Undoubtedly, we tend to put a heavy emphasis on the lowly circumstances of Jesus' birth when we retell the Christmas story each year. Certainly this is appropriate, for the Son of God humbled Himself profoundly when He "emptied himself, by taking the form of a servant, being born in the likeness of men" (Phil. 2:5–8). Christ's entire life was marked by humiliation, as He moved from a manger in Bethlehem to life as a common person in Nazareth to His ignoble death on the cross. Yet this humiliation led finally to glory. God the Father, because Jesus had been faithful to His mission, exalted Jesus and "bestowed on him the name that is above every name" (vv. 9–11).

Our Savior's glory was veiled by human flesh in His incarnation, and it remained hidden throughout much of His ministry. Yet there were points in our Savior's life when His glory shone temporarily through the veil. The best example of this is the transfiguration, the moment when Peter, James, and John were granted a vision of the Lord's glory as it shone through the flesh of the Savior (Matt. 17:1–13). Furthermore, this glory also shone brightly at times when the people might not have been expecting it. In the midst of the humbling conditions of our Lord's birth (poverty, being unable to find shelter in Bethlehem), there was a special manifestation of the Messiah's glory to people nearby. The account of this manifestation is found in today's passage.

While Mary and Joseph tended to their son, many shepherds were nearby tending their flocks (Luke 2:8). In those days, shepherds occupied the bottom rung of society's ladder, and the average citizen of Judea wanted little to do with these keepers of sheep. No one could have predicted that the first people to hear of Jesus outside of His parents would be a motley crew of shepherds. Nevertheless, an angel of the Lord appeared to these men, who got to watch the greatest sound-and-light show of all time (Luke 2:8–9).

Understandably, the shepherds were afraid (v. 9), but in this case the glory of the Lord's presence, which they could otherwise not endure, was a good thing. This was the announcement of the Savior, the One who had come to redeem even society's outcasts. So, after the angels sang their praises to the Lord, the shepherds hastily traveled into Bethlehem to see the wonderful gift the Father had given to His people (vv. 15–16).

The shepherds were eager to see the Savior of the world, and we should be eager to see Him as well. This involves not only coming to Him in our conversions but also seeking His face each and every day of our lives. Though we will not see the fullness of His glory until we see Him face to face in heaven, we will nonetheless come to a fuller appreciation of this glory as we study His Word and pray to Him. Let us be diligent in these means of grace.





Malawi: Placing the Bible into the hands of hungry people



Earlier this year, PresAID Convener John Wilson, led a team of 15 self-funded Presbyterians to distribute 5,000 Bibles in remote villages in Malawi.

He writes: “Our task was to present Bibles in their own language to those who'd never before possessed one. These people had come to believe aurally – from the teachings of mum

and dad, of faithful elders, and by hearing the occasional biblical sermon from a pastor who could only visit each of his 12 congregations once every two months.

Through this team's timely efforts, the Word of God has been placed in many hands and homes that have long hungered for the Word of God. Their act of Christian love (along with you who supported them from home churches) has strengthened Malawian church leaders and helped to revive and establish a keenness towards discipleship, and a consistent and systematic approach to bible study practice at church and home.


NUMBERS DON'T TELL THE WHOLE STORY, BUT...

- 5,000 Church of Central Africa Presbyterian (CCAP) members each received a Bible. Most given with a handshake and personal greeting.
- 2,000 hymnbooks distributed for congregational singing. These were given in bulk, a box to each Session Clerk for their congregation.
- 2,000 protective cloth bags for women's Bibles.
- 5,000 bookmarks (with Chichewa language Bible Study method on the back).
- 50 copies of Douglas Milne's gift of his Commentary on Romans – one to each pastor.

Bible Study sessions (in 'small' groups)

- 50 small-group COMA-method Bible studies
- 20 Bible story-as-whole sessions.

MUSIC AND MINISTRY UNDER AN OUTBACK SKY

The Presbyterian Inland Mission's 2025 *Tracks Outback Concert* proved to be another memorable weekend for all those who travelled to New Dunesk, PIM's ministry hub, training centre and campground in southern NSW.

Over the first weekend in October, the campground was a buzz as over 250 people from across Australia descended on New Dunesk, enjoying good music, warm fellowship and a range of uniquely country activities. Young mixed with old, and long-time

supporters greeted new faces, all in support of the work of PIM to make and mature disciples of the Lord Jesus Christ in remote and rural Australia. A campfire singalong, nail drive competition, facepainting, colouring competition for the kids, and 4WD tours of the 600 acre property were enjoyed by many on the Friday night and Saturday morning.

Steve Messer's *Strange Country* opened the concert on Saturday, captivating the crowd with their authentic storytelling and rhythm'n'bluegrass sound. Their set was a nod to the bush—raw, honest and deeply Australian.

Next up, Zoë Tyne held the crowd with her soulful vocals and original songs that told tales of hope, resilience and faith in an Australian context. Zoë's stage

Seeing Christmas Through New Eyes—R C Sproul

I remember as a young boy growing up in Pittsburgh and always dreaming of a white Christmas. It was a tradition in our home to go to the Christmas Eve service every year. That service began at eleven o'clock, but we would have to assemble outside of the church at about quarter after ten because so many people congregated for that special candlelight event. It was filled with pageantry and great choral music. And at about thirteen minutes to twelve, the minister would begin his Christmas Eve homily. And just as the clock reached twelve o'clock, in the middle of his sermon, there was a signal given to the organist, and the organist would play the chimes in the church as if they were the chimes of a clock striking twelve. The pastor would stop his sermon in mid-sentence as the chimes would begin to sound one, two, three, four, and we would all sit there in the pews and count them. As soon as the twelfth tone had registered, the pastor would smile to the congregation and he would say, "It's Christmas. And may I be the first on this day to wish you a Merry Christmas?"

Well, that used to send chills up and down my spine. It was a tradition. He did it every year. In fact, he preached the same sermon every year on Christmas Eve and the candlelight service. As I grew up, I never wanted to miss a service, and particularly on those Christmas Eves when it had snowed and the lawn was covered in the new fallen snow. There was just something about it. I loved it. But I was not a believer. To me, this was all exciting pageantry where the real fun came the next morning when we got to open the presents and enjoy the visitation of the man from the North Pole.

Then in 1957, in September of that year, I had my conversion to Christianity. And like any new Christian or young Christian, I was absolutely absorbed with the discovery of Christ. It was utter sweetness to me, and I had great delight in reading the Scriptures and talking to people about the things of God. Well, that happened in September. By October, I was still walking on air. In November I was still sky-high, but I was already experiencing the ups and downs that new Christians tend to have. But I remember my first Christmas as a Christian—coming back home for the holidays, driving through the snow to the church, going into the sanctuary, singing the same hymns that I had sung for so many years, hearing exactly the same sermon, hearing the chimes strike midnight. And this time when the minister interrupted his sermon and listened to the chimes and then leaned over the pulpit and said, "It's Christmas," I was ready to walk through the door into heaven. It was all the joy that I could handle because now for the first time I was experiencing this pageantry as reality, as truth, as something that had really taken place.

CHILDREN: The Great Omission - Really

As a parent, grandparent and great grandparent, I wonder if I was really aware of the Lord's instructions on how to raise my children. Like many others I look around today and wonder "what is going on with our young people?". This concern has encouraged me to write this article, and it may be of some benefit to others also.

I have been very conscious of the medical research that shows how important it is in the first 5 years of a child's life to demonstrate love, concern for each other and discipline. Many years ago, a very wise gentleman pointed out "If you don't teach children discipline, they will not have self-discipline". Hebrews 12;11 NIV.

That is also true of so many other aspects of life and the Bible is the cornerstone for all of us to know how we should live out our roles as committed Christians and to show God's love and concern for each other. I would invite you to ponder on these three verses from the Bible and ask yourself these three questions.

1: Did I do all that was expected of me. 2: How am I doing now. 3: What do I need to do.

Proverbs 22:6 *"Start (train) children off on the way they should go, and even when they are old, they will not turn from it."*

Deuteronomy 6: 6-7 *"These commandments that I give you today are to be upon your hearts. Impress them on your children. Talk about them when you sit at home and when you walk along the road, when you lie down and when you get up."*

Matthew 19:14 Jesus said, *"Let the little children come to me, and do not hinder them, for the kingdom of heaven belongs to such as these."*

My quick summation is that if children do not experience true and sincere love, direction and yes even discipline in those early years of childhood they will struggle to be the person that God would want them to be. God's plan in John 10:10 explains that there are forces against us, but Jesus has come that we may have a useful and purposeful life.

My prayer is that the Lord will bless your efforts as you ask Him for guidance as to how to be a better and more effective role model for children within your family and community.

May the lord give you His guidance and wisdom on how we can best serve our children. They do not have a voice; you and I are their voices.


We need to be aware of what governments and politically motivated groups are endeavouring to do to hinder and even eliminate our Christian heritage. We need to act now to protect our children's future.
